Augha

Achao pionzlap no Achao Anozlap, The field of the green tillage (Joyce)

Siting;

On high ground overlooking valley of River barrow on east side, opposite Old Leighlin.

Period of occupation;

5 th to 13 th cent (est)

Public access;

On farm of Nolan family. Access with permission through farmyard.

History

Founded by St Aed / Maedog (mo Aooh 05) in 6th c

St Fintan of Clonenagh (Co Laois) was abbot here.

Pillaged by Vikings in 864 AD.

In AD 1016 Abbot Conmbach was slain by the Ui-Bairrche a local clan.

Orientation;

Church is E-W

Current condition;

In ruins. East and west gables and south wall extant, north wall collapsed completely.

Internal dimensions; 45'-6 x 15'-6".

This church was built in two stages. Earliest stage at West side has stonework of exceptional quality (hammer dressed.), with L/W ratio of 2:1. The later extension making L/W ratio 3:1 stonework is much inferior.

Early stone buildings make limited use of chiselled stonework. It is confined mainly to cills, quoins, window & door surrounds, because of the high cost of the skilled labour required. The inner / outer main walls are usually of selected field stones with random rubble in the centre. This was the dominant style of construction until the 19th c when ashler cut stonework appears.


Interesting objects on site

Base of monastic cross on site. Remains of water mill in farmyard. Large slab with rectangular opening may be a second cross base.

Survey result

Present ruin was built in 10th cent. A later extension to NW located, but now no visible trace. The Celtic cross (which once rested on existing base) was located below ground a few paces to E. Also to SE and within a few paces of the church ruin is another small 10th c building, presumably the priests residence.





Artists reconstruction of 8th c granite cross in graveyard, extrapolated from base dimensions and by divining. The cross is similar to others of same period locally eg Killeogan & Old Leiglin.



Unenclosed church and cross bases Pre-Norman rectangular structure (13.9m x 4.7m) of granite with W gable entrance and antae, built on platform against side of valley; two cross bases in immediate vicinity of church. E gable has narrow ope with single stone round head and wide end splay. S wall has two opes. Trabeate lintelled door in centre of W gable. Anta with base batter preserved at SW corner. NW angle has collapsed. Two cross bases: (1) very regular slightly pyramidal rectangular granite block with rectangular socket and tapering mortice; (2) large thin rectangular granite flag, with rectangular socket; comparable shape to late medieval wayside crosses in Co. Kildare. (Gwynn and Hadcock 1988, 372)




There are imprints of buildings on site prior to the 10th c ruin. These buildings were constructed of clay and wattle with thatched roofs.
